**Remember 4 ways to search:** You can do a [directory](http://directory.google.com/) (“drill down” search, find a site that has the right type of information and then follow links from its links page, use a computer based search engine like [webferret](http://www.ferretsoft.com) or use a search engine like Google.

## Using a Search Engine – Google ([www.google.com](http://www.google.com))

1. Write a list of keywords first. Many of these will come from the questions you are asking.

Mummies, ancient, Egypt, civilization, customs, pyramid, building, slaves etc

2. Choose the best three or four keywords that focus on your topic. Choose these keywords carefully they will help “find the needle in the haystack.”

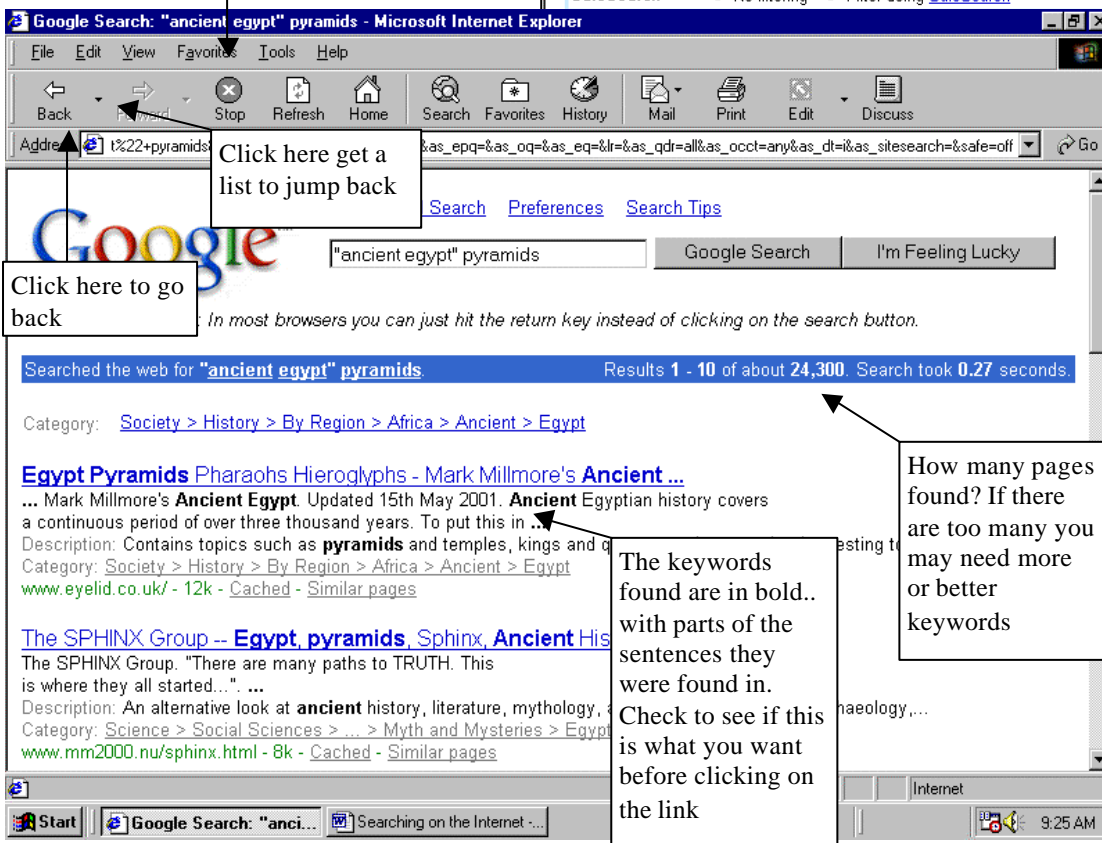
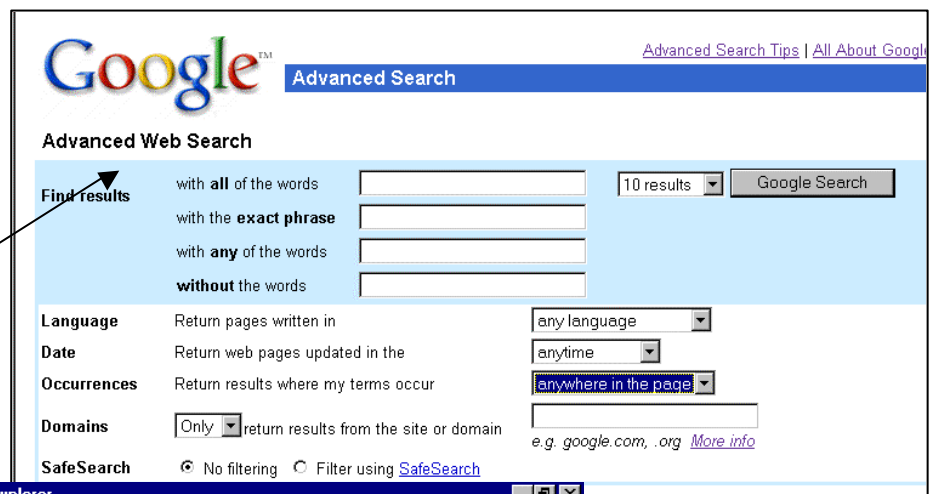
3. Refine your search by adding more words if your first search doesn't work  
i.e. to find information on pyramids in Ancient Egypt

4. If you are wanting to find a phrase  
try using quotation marks “ “  
i.e. this will find the phrase

“ancient egypt” pyramids

5. Use the advanced search page



### When you arrive at a site:

- Skim eyes over main titles and buttons to assess if the site will meet your needs.
- Use a search feature on the site to find the exact information you require
- Use Ctrl+F to find a word on a particular page
